4.5 Computer, Internet access, training to teachers and students and any other programme for technology upgradation (Networking, e-Governance etc.)

The institution has a resourceful technology enabled learning environment.

The computer laboratory has 30 computers apart from 12 computers used for academic and administrative purposes with LAN environment.

Training to Staff

The staff members who did not have familiarity in using computer and internet were given training in basic computer skills.
